WILCOX CREEK COOPERATIVE HOMES

Take the 401 and go east to Morningside; go north on Morningside until you get to Sewells Road. Make a right hand turn on to Sewells, then turn left onto the second driveway.

Wilcox Creek Co-op is a quaint 84 townhouse complex located within the community of Malvern and home to families, singles and seniors of diverse ethnic and economic backgrounds. The co-op is

also a former home to such celebrities as FeFe Dobson, Deborah Cox (both singers) & a current home to Iraq artist, Ishrak Sahar (painter).
